Into Action

It's often said that crisis and adversity don't build character, they reveal it. The past year has certainly proven this sentiment to be true. Individuals and communities throughout the Hill Country stepped up – neighbors helping neighbors – to support each other in a trying time. A few of the activities the Community Foundation was able to support are reflected in this report.

Donations to the Community Foundation significantly increased in 2020, as did its giving. At the behest of visionary donors, the Foundation created three emergency funds to help residents get household essentials, support charities adapting to meet new and greater needs, and supply frontline workers at schools and nonprofits with the personal protective equipment necessary to maintain a safe environment.

Despite an unpredictable year, the fundamentals of the Community Foundation remained strong: \$4.5 million was granted out, its investments returned a net 8.5%, and its assets reached \$35 million.

With a community foundation that's healthy, strong, and active, we can maintain a Hill Country quality of life no matter what life throws at us.



Covid-19 Emergency Grants

The Community Foundation created three distinct emergency funds in 2020; all three raised a total of **\$540,000** from several hundred donors.

The funds made grants to organizations for personal protective equipment, technology upgrades, household utility support and groceries, and other pandemic-related needs.

Community Impact Fund

For 2020, our Community Impact Fund – which typically accepts applications – decided to proactively make grants to its previous grantees working on the front lines of pandemic response – individual grants of at least \$10,000 went to Meals on Wheels providers, food pantries and community clinics.

Sisterhood for Good

A women's giving circle with chapters in Fredericksburg and Kerrville, Sisterhood brought over 200 women virtually together to do community philanthropy – despite the pandemic. In Fredericksburg, the Sisterhood granted \$21,000 to the Grace Center; in Kerrville, Light on the Hill won a \$15,000 grant for food relief.



Scholarships

There are over 50 scholarship funds at the Community Foundation. Last year, those funds awarded \$279,000 to over 100 Hill Country students enrolled in higher education.
